In 2023, HCA Healthcare developed and implemented a Hospital Emergency Management Metrics Program, consisting of 144 metrics within 20 all hazards and incident-specific competencies, at its 180+ acute care hospitals across the United States to assess the facilities’ readiness for emergencies. Preparing your hospital to access and utilize such services should be done prior to the need. What happens when a trusted system, which may be decades old, fails to provide the utility that we take for granted? We experienced a house wide Medical Gas failure. This is not a common utility outage, so the alternate plan is rarely exercised. Bottle adapters were incorrect, expedited parts were incorrect. 2:30 – 3:30pm	<p><i>There’s No Place Like Home: An Integrated Emergency Preparedness Approach to an Expanding Healthcare at Home Program (EM.11.01.01.04; EM.12.01.01.02; EM.12.02.05.01; EM.12.02.05.04)</i></p> <p>The Mass General Brigham Healthcare at Home emergency preparedness program was designed to support 3 entities (Home Care, Home Hospital, and MGB Ambulance) using a centralized emergency operations plan and a thorough hazard vulnerability analysis.
